In horizontal runs, cables should be fastened to transverse members of the tray, while vertical runs may require additional support or approved clamps for longer drops . Proper spacing is also important to maintain airflow and prevent heat buildup, which can affect ampacity and insulation longevity .

Best Practices

- o Avoid overtightening: Leave enough space to fit a finger under the tie to prevent insulation damage .
- o Use appropriate materials: For outdoor or sun-exposed installations, use UV-resistant or sunlight-rated ties .
- o Spacing: Secure cables at intervals that prevent sagging or stress, typically at transitions or every 1.8 meters (6 feet) for horizontal runs .
- o Alternative fasteners: Hook-and-loop fasteners can be used for delicate data or communication cables to avoid over-cinching .
