## Understanding IP Ratings

IP (Ingress Protection) ratings consist of two digits following the letters "IP" that describe the enclosure's resistance to solids and liquids .

- o First digit (0-6): Measures protection against solid objects and dust. Higher numbers indicate better dust resistance. For example, 5 means most dust is kept out, while 6 indicates complete dust tightness.
- o Second digit (0-9K): Measures protection against water. Common levels include 4 (resistant to splashing water), 5 (resistant to low-pressure water jets), 6 (resistant to powerful water jets), and higher numbers for immersion or high-pressure cleaning .

## Common IP Ratings and Applications

- o IP30: Protects against large dust particles, no water resistance. Suitable for indoor dry areas like server rooms .
- o IP40: Blocks small objects and dust, still no water resistance. Ideal for office ceilings or utility closets .
- o IP44: Prevents entry of objects larger than 1 mm and resists water splashes. Common for indoor wet areas or short-term outdoor exposure .
- o IP54: Keeps out most dust and resists splashing water from any direction. Suitable for humid indoor spaces like kitchens or basements .
- o IP55: Full dust protection and defense against low-pressure water jets. Fits semi-outdoor areas such as covered patios or garages .
- o IP65: Completely dust-tight and resists powerful water jets. Designed for open outdoor areas, construction sites, or rooftop installations .
- o IP66-IP69K: For extreme conditions, including high-pressure water jets, immersion, or industrial washdowns, often used in factories, food processing, or offshore platforms .

## Choosing the Right IP Rating

When selecting a distribution box, consider:

- o Environment: Indoor dry areas may only need IP30-IP44, while outdoor or high-humidity areas require IP55-IP65.
- o Exposure to water: Areas with splashes, rain, or cleaning jets need higher water protection.
- o Dust and debris: Industrial or construction sites require higher dust protection (IP55-IP66).
