

Article Overview

After wall demolition, an electrical distribution box must be safely isolated, clearly marked, and either temporarily relocated or reinstalled according to construction and demolition electrical standards.

Safety and Energy Isolation

Before any work on the distribution box, ensure all circuits are de-energized and air-gapped. Air-gapped means the equipment is physically disconnected from all potential sources of hazardous energy and cannot store energy internally, preventing accidental shock or fire hazards . Circuits that remain live should be flagged with red DANGER tape, while circuits that are disconnected but not demolished should be marked with yellow CAUTION tape . Use durable tags or labels to indicate the status of each circuit clearly.

Temporary Electrical Supply

If power is needed during demolition or renovation, consider a temporary electrical installation. This may involve a portable generator or a temporary mains supply with proper RCD protection and earthing, ensuring compliance with standards such as BS 7671 or AS/NZS 3012:2019 for construction sites . Temporary distribution units should be robust, with metal-sheathed or armored cables for 230 V or 400 V circuits, and all outlets should be clearly identified and color-coded to distinguish them from permanent wiring .

Reinstallation or Relocation

After demolition, the distribution box can be reinstalled or relocated. Follow selective demolition procedures: remove conduit, junction boxes, and cabling carefully to avoid damage to adjacent structures or circuits that remain in service . If the box is to be reused, inspect all components for damage, ensure proper grounding, and reconnect circuits according to approved design documents . Any salvaged components should be cleaned, tested, and prepared for safe reuse.

Marking and Documentation

Maintain a record of all circuit locations, cable routes, and temporary installations. Use maps or plans to document the depth and routing of underground or concealed wiring, and mark overhead or exposed wiring clearly to prevent accidental contact during ongoing construction . Proper documentation ensures safety for all workers and compliance with regulatory standards.

Key Considerations

- o Avoid working on ladders when scaffolding or lifts are available to reduce fall risk .

By following these procedures, the electrical distribution box can be safely managed during and after wall demolition, minimizing hazards and ensuring compliance with construction and demolition electrical standards.
