



How to lay out the wiring for both high-voltage and low-voltage circuits in the same cabinet

Article Overview

High-voltage and low-voltage wiring can share a cabinet if properly separated, insulated, and labeled, following NEC guidelines and best practices.

Separation and Safety

High-voltage wiring (over 50V) and low-voltage wiring (50V or less) should not be mixed in the same conduit due to risks of electrical shock, fire, insulation breakdown, and signal interference . Within a cabinet, separation can be achieved by:

- o Physical barriers: Use plastic or metal dividers to keep high-voltage and low-voltage wires apart .
- o Dedicated sides: Assign one side of the cabinet for high-voltage circuits and the other for low-voltage circuits, keeping them as far apart as practical .
- o Separate knockouts: Feed high-voltage and low-voltage wires through different conduit knockouts to maintain separation .

Wire Ratings and Insulation

All wires in the enclosure should have insulation rated for the highest voltage present. For example, if combining 120V AC and 24V DC circuits, low-voltage wires should be rated for at least 600V to comply with NEC 300.3(C), . Using appropriately sized conductors and color-coded wires helps prevent confusion and ensures safety during maintenance.

Labeling and Documentation

- o Label all wires clearly to indicate voltage and function.
- o Maintain a schematic or wiring diagram inside or near the cabinet for reference.
- o Color-code wires according to standard conventions (e.g., black/red for high-voltage, blue/white for low-voltage).

Practical Considerations

- o Avoid running low-voltage control wiring alongside branch power wiring in the same tray or conduit to prevent electromagnetic interference .
- o If a device requires both voltages (e.g., a relay with a 24V coil and 120V load), ensure the wiring is physically separated within the enclosure and that the low-voltage side uses wires rated for the higher voltage .



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o Follow manufacturer instructions for equipment that combines high and low voltage, as many panels provide dedicated headers and conduit access points for each voltage type .
