Regulatory Context

In March 2026, the FCC updated its Covered List to include all consumer-grade routers produced outside the United States, effectively prohibiting new foreign-made models from receiving standard FCC equipment authorization unless they obtain Conditional Approval . This regulatory framework ensures that routers already deployed in the U.S. can continue operating without forced replacement, which is a key anti-cycling measure. Existing certified devices remain eligible for software and firmware updates through March 1, 2027, allowing them to maintain security and functionality without requiring hardware replacement .

Anti-Cycling Mechanisms

Anti-cycling in telecom-grade routers involves several strategies:

- o Extended Firmware Support: U.S. service providers and manufacturers continue to provide updates for existing routers, mitigating vulnerabilities without replacing hardware .
- o Conditional Approval Pathway: New foreign-made routers can only enter the market after rigorous security review, reducing the need for frequent replacement due to security risks .
- o Enterprise-Grade Exemption: Enterprise routers from companies like Cisco, Juniper, and Aruba are not subject to the consumer-grade ban, allowing critical infrastructure to maintain stable, long-term deployments .
- o Lifecycle Management Policies: ISPs often supply routers to customers and manage device lifecycles, ensuring routers are replaced only when necessary for performance or security upgrades, rather than due to regulatory changes .

Implications for Security and Supply Chain

The FCC's ban addresses vulnerabilities exploited in cyberattacks such as Volt, Salt, and Flax Typhoon, which targeted foreign-made routers . By controlling the approval of new devices and supporting existing hardware, the U.S. reduces the risk of forced cycling due to security breaches. However, the ban also highlights supply chain challenges, as most consumer routers are manufactured abroad, making domestic production and long-term lifecycle planning critical for anti-cycling strategies .
